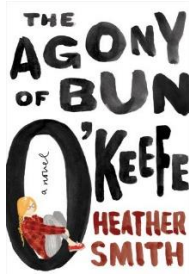


36 Questions That Changed My Mind About You

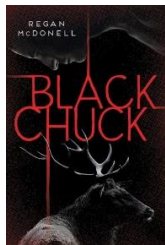

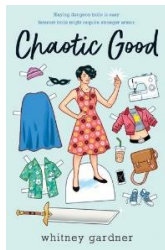


Catching the Light

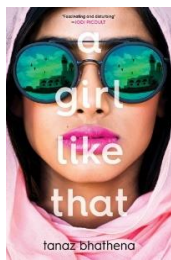


Chaotic Good

Cosplay, comic shops, and college applications collide in this illustrated novel, perfect for fans of Adam Silvera and Noelle Steveson!

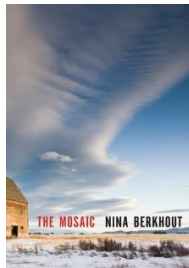

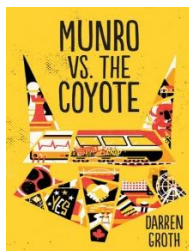


The Mosaic

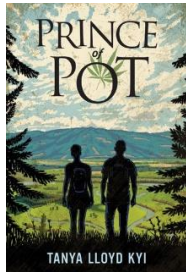

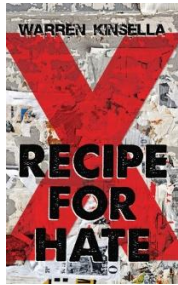
